We write in support of the University of Kentucky (UK) College of Agriculture's Fiscal Year 2024 Community Project Funding request to assist researchers at the Gluck Equine Research Center in developing the equine biological passport (EBP). Specifically, UK is requesting funding from the United States Department of Agriculture to purchase equipment, hire researchers and analyze data to develop the EBP.

The health of our beloved horses is paramount to our industry, which supports some 65,000 workers in Kentucky. Current drug and medication testing of our equine athletes detects the presence of a limited number of substances. The EBP would be distinct, giving practitioners the ability to learn more about how legitimate medication and illicit substances impact horses biologically and long-term. The passport program would also broaden the spectrum of substances that can be detected. Importantly, the EBP would better identify racehorses which are at-risk of injury before they compete, with the goal of decreasing injuries and breakdowns. Simply put, the passport program would make our sport safer and support Kentucky jobs.
